



Act of Faith and Act of Protest:

Beginnings of Same-Sex Marriage at MCC Toronto

The French priest and paleontologist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin had it right – beginnings are hard to distinguish. When it comes to the beginnings of same-sex marriage, there are plenty of stories and plenty of claims.

Were the first same-sex marriages held at MCC Toronto? The short answer is *kind of*. There are stories of same-sex marriages from throughout history.

Elagabalus, the third-century Roman Emperor, married an athlete named Zoticus in an extravagant public ceremony. But not only did the emperor's privilege not extend to ordinary citizens, Elagabalus could probably be considered a trans woman.

Elisa Sanchez used the name Mario and wore a suit and tie so she and her girlfriend Marcela could marry in Spain in 1901. The couple had to flee to the Americas when authorities discovered their ruse.

There have been countless blessing ceremonies, civil unions, and other special rites to unite same-sex couples over the years. MCC Toronto began celebrating these unions almost 50 years ago.

The Netherlands was the first country to enshrine same-gender marriage in law, with the legalization taking effect on April 1, 2001. The mayor of Amsterdam himself performed four same-sex weddings at the stroke of midnight on that date. Our friends in the Netherlands deserve plenty of credit for their history-making role in the fight for equal marriage. But 11 weeks before those four weddings happened in Amsterdam, two same-sex couples stood at the front of our sanctuary and were joined in marriage by Rev. Brent Hawkes.

Were the marriages legal? At the time, *not exactly*. But the ceremonies were conducted publicly and deliberately, as an act of faith and an act of protest. These weddings weren't held to trick authorities, to be civil unions rather than marriages, or to be sacred but legally nonbinding. They were held to confront injustice and to influence lasting social change.

And that's just what they did. The resulting legal battle took years to resolve, but love, as they say, *wins*. Ontario made marriage equality official in 2003. By that time, a few other countries had legalized same-sex marriage. But Ontario's marriage equality law came with legal recognition of the two marriages held at MCC Toronto in January 2001.

So, did MCC Toronto host and perform the world's first same-sex marriages? *Well, not really.*

But did we *make history* with weddings that, once they were officially recognized, became the first legal same-sex marriages in modern times?

You bet we did. And it happened 22 years ago tomorrow on January 14.


