A. Paul Austin Human Rights Centre: Growing Impact

- Strong Leadership: Since its launch in 2022, the Paul Austin Human Rights Centre has grown under the leadership of Kenyatta Barnaby, Manager of Human Rights & Community Outreach, and Dave Kerr, Senior Director, supported by five amazing volunteers. A brand-new Human Rights Advisory Committee is coming soon to help shape the next phase of this vital work.
- Programs Making Waves:
 - Proud Voices: A dynamic speaker series uplifting queer advocates, already reaching over 440 people both person and online.
 - All Bodies on Gender: Weekly yoga and dance sessions, bringing joy and connection to 120 participants.
 - Youth Therapy: Partnering with Redbird Therapy, supporting 19 youth so far
 - Youth Leadership Micro-Grants: Helping young leaders launch advocacy and wellness projects.
 - Refugee Support Legacy: MCC Toronto's longstanding ministry of refugee support is thriving—36,000 new members welcomed this year, with 118 sponsored privately and 17 through government-assisted programs, alongside our strong partnership with Rainbow Railroad.
- Mental Health & Community Care: The Centre's wellness offerings—yoga, dance, and youth therapy—are proving to be powerful tools for healing and connection.

- New Energy on Staff: With new hires in communications and database management, our operations are running stronger than ever.
- Finances: Our financial forecast shows that we will need to stretch to meet our year-end goals. With upcoming fundraising events and your continued support, we are excited and confident about meeting this need.

D. Congregational Life & Care: Together in Respect, Together in Care.

- Sanctuary Decorum: A new set of expectations is being gently introduced—first
 to volunteers and new members—to encourage respect, hospitality, and
 inclusivity across generations and cultures.
- Policies for a Strong Foundation: A new working group will streamline and review our policies, making sure MCC Toronto is always operating with integrity and best practices.
- Congregational Care: Over 300 calls came in during July and August, the majority for refugee support. The Board is exploring solutions like a dedicated refugee phone line to ensure both congregants and refugees are well served.
